Everything looks positive. Following Prospect's reduction of its real estate tax rate, all of this year's tax bills were mailed out last week. Thank you to our entire staff, who all pitched in, including our Public Works Department and receptionists.

We received the welcome news that Prospect is again rated as one of the three SAFEST cities IN KENTUCKY! I have no doubt this is due to our excellent police force – patrolling our neighborhoods 24 hours every day, and con-

ducting hundreds of house watches during the year. This Newsletter will feature our police. I also want to thank a staff member who may be unknown to you. Julie Osborne, the City's bookkeeper, keeps track of every financial detail and where we are in our budget at any given time, making monthly reports which are given to all Council members.



The U.S.42 Safety Study is complete, and we are about to enter the "Design Phase." We again will be working closely with the Ky. Transportation Cabinet, who are enthusiastic about moving this to the final "Construction Phase." This will not happen overnight, but it is progressing.

All City Of Prospect Tax Bills Have Been Mailed Taxes Are Due By September 30th

2022 City of Prospect real estate tax bills have been mailed to all property owners. Included with your tax bill are two '23 Prospect car stickers (additional stickers can be acquired at City Hall).

The face value of the tax is due by September 30, 2022 (post-mark is accepted as the date paid). On October 1, 2022, all unpaid tax bills will be assessed at a one-time 10% penalty and assessed 1% monthly compounded interest.

Come Celebrate Arborfest

FIRST ANNUAL YOUTH NATURE CRAFT PROJECT IN THE PARK




The City of Prospect Police Department is comprised of 12 sworn police officers (full and part-time) that cover the residential and commercial areas around our City, including a small section of a major interstate and a federal highway. The department also has an Administrative Assistant who assists the public with reports, fingerprinting services and the House Watch program. The Code Enforcement Officer is assigned to the police department and is responsible for the enforcement of code violations throughout the city and the issuance of various permits required by ordinance.

The men and women working for the Prospect Police Department have over 300 years of law enforcement experience and have served in many different assignments throughout their careers (management, patrol and investigative units involving violent crimes, crimes against children, property crimes, narcotics, evidence collection, accident investigation, etc.). We are fortunate to have such a well-rounded staff, capable of serving our city at the highest level.

The members of the Prospect Police Department, in partnership with all members of our community, strive for excellence in professional law enforcement service. Their goal is to protect life and property and to instill a feeling of safety in all our citizens. The House Watch program plays a vital role in our crime prevention efforts. The police department conducts over 30,000 house checks per year. For several years in a row the City of Prospect is rated (via crime statistics) amongst the Top 5 safest cities in Kentucky. - Chief Jeff Sherrard
