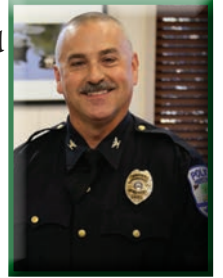
State of the City Address

The state of the City of Prospect is strong. I will comment on our police, our parks, our finances, and our vibrant sense of community.

Under the leadership of Tony Denham and his predecessor, Jeff Sherrard, our police department has become a highly professional and effective law enforcement agency. In 2024, we welcomed Tony as our new police chief, and he has excelled in that role.

One year ago, we had two vacancies in our 12 person police department. On average, we had two to three hours per day when we did not have a Prospect police officer on duty. (During those times, LMPD covered calls in Prospect.) The compensation we paid our officers had fallen behind our peer cities, and as a result we could not fill the vacancies. Tony then our assistant chief, encouraged the city to substantially increase the amount we pay our police. The Council and I agreed. As a result, we now have a full complement of officers and have Prospect police on duty in the city 24-7.

Our officers all had substantial police experience before they came to Prospect and most of them had supervisory positions in their previous departments. I have had the good fortune to get to know our officers. I have found that they are thoughtful and intelligent and that they exercise good judgment as they carry out their duties.

I encourage you to take a moment to consider how fortunate we are to live in one of the safest cities in Kentucky.

Public safety is my number one priority. Having said that, I also have a strong commitment to our parks. Under the leadership of John Evans, Prospect made significant improvements to Little Hunting Creek Park including the construction of the John Evans Pavilion and Charlotte's Playground. In 2024, the city completed work on a new pedestrian bridge in Harrods Creek Park. Another significant parks project, a proposed boardwalk that will connect City Hall to Putney Pond, continues to move forward under Don Gibson's leadership. The city recently received a generous gift of two acres of land that will permit the boardwalk to connect to Timber Ridge Drive improving walkability and connectivity in the city. Our Parks are the crown jewels of Prospect. In 2024, under the leadership of Linda Wardell and our Parks Committee, we held our second season of summer concerts, the second performance by Kentucky Shakespeare, a successful Kidz Fest, and an equally successful trail bash. We also enjoyed wildflower walks in Harrods Creek Park, a bird watching walk in Little Hunting Creek Park, Prospect's 50th birthday party, our Fourth of July celebration, and other events.

Thanks to Parks Committee member Lynn Granger and two Eagle Scout candidates, we now have two kiosks in Little Hunting Creek Park –

one near the playground and the second at the trailhead just off Fox Harbor Road.

Art in City Hall Prospect, under the leadership of Kathie Sauer and her Art Committee, has proven to be a resounding success. We have had six exhibitions including the one that is now on display, and those exhibitions have brought color and a sense of fun to City Hall. Our next exhibition, chaired by Becky Culbreath and entitled “Winter into Spring,” will begin with an opening reception from 2 – 5 pm on Sunday, March 23.

The City benefits tremendously from the work of our volunteers. In addition to our Parks Committee, Arts Committee, and Investments Committee our residents serve the city as members of our Forestation Board, Code Enforcement Board, Library Committee, Architectural Review Committee, and Ethics Commission.

We also benefit daily from the work of our superb staff. Ron Cundiff and John Carter and their teams do the city’s work in a professional and timely manner.

The partnership of our staff, police, council, volunteers, and two major vendors – Rumpke and GreenScapes -- serves our city well. The relationships and friendships created by this partnership weave us together as a community in the best way possible.

In the balance of this report, I will address four additional matters: the April tornado, a lawsuit against the city, improvements to City Hall, and the state of the city’s finances.

At 6 pm on Tuesday, April 2, Liza and I were watching WAVE news. Kevin Harned reported that a tornado had formed in Southern Indiana, had crossed the river, and was headed for Chestnut Hill in Prospect. Because our house sits between the river and Chestnut Hill, we immediately moved to our basement. We heard the tornado pass overhead, and what has been stated many times is true -- the tornado sounded like a train.

On April 4, two days after the tornado struck, I wrote to our citizens stating, “Today, I wish a muted Happy 50th Birthday to Prospect.” I noted that on April 4, 1974, the Commonwealth of Kentucky issued the charter that created the City of Prospect. I went on to report that two days before I made my report, an EF-3 tornado struck Sutherland, Hunting Creek, the Estates of Hunting Creek, and the Meadows at Covered Bridge. We were extremely fortunate that no one in Prospect sustained injury. The tornado and its aftermath underscore for us the advantages of Prospect being a city. Because Prospect exists as a city, we can employ a professional public works staff and excellent police officers. I also wrote that I often offer praise for our police officers, and rightly so. On April 4, I added words of deep appreciation for our director of public works, Ron Cundiff, and his team. They returned to Prospect Tuesday evening and worked until midnight clearing our streets. They then came in early on Wednesday morning and continued to work throughout the day. GreenScapes also came to Prospect on Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning and worked with Ron and his team on the cleanup.

Within minutes after the tornado came through Prospect, our police chief Jeff Sherrard returned to the city and worked until 2:00 a.m. (Typically, we have one or two officers on duty at any given time. On that Tuesday evening, four officers in addition to Jeff were on duty.) Between 7:00 and 11:00 p.m., I rode with Jeff as he patrolled Hunting Creek, the Estates of Hunting Creek, Sutherland, the Meadows at Covered Bridge, and the Breakers. The point of my April 4th report was not to recount the events of Tuesday evening. Rather it was to recognize on our 50th birthday how fortunate we are that we live in Prospect.

I closed my address by stating that April 4, was a good day to take stock and to celebrate the community we have built in the years between 1974 and 2024.

As a postscript, the City incurred more than \$200,000 in cleanup costs following the tornado. Three of our neighbors have not yet been able to move back into their damaged homes as contractors continue to make repairs.

A different challenge arose a year before the tornado. In January 2023, LDG Development brought a lawsuit against the city of Louisville’s Metro Council, the city of Louisville itself, and the City of Prospect. We continue to vigorously defend Prospect’s position in that lawsuit. The parties have filed motions for summary judgment, and the court currently has those motions under consideration. If the court denies the motions, the case will proceed to trial

in July of this year. Although we take the lawsuit seriously, we firmly believe that LDG's claims lack merit.

In recent years, we have worked to make improvements to City Hall. Under John Evans leadership, improvements included the expansion and repaving of our parking lot, substantial roof repairs, and the installation of a new outside door to the Council Room. In the past two years, we have updated our HVAC system, painted walls and trim on the first floor, and replaced shutters and windows where needed.

I will close this report by noting that the city is on a sound financial footing. Our spending in 2024 was \$150,000 below budget. We continue to reserve funds sufficient to cover the city's share of the shortfall in the state's pension system. With guidance from our Investments Committee, we invest our reserves and our accumulated surplus produces income totaling approximately \$125,000 annually. John Carter and I closely watch the city's spending, and we remain committed to fiscal responsibility.

It is an honor to serve as Prospect's mayor, and I look forward to continuing our shared work in the coming years.

Wild Sound Scapes of Prospect and Surrounding Areas

Naturalist and sound artist Luke Pearson will help decode the mysteries of nature with an introduction to the wildlife sounds of our own Prospect community. Luke is an educator for the Louisville Nature Center and wildlife specialist for Cave Hill

Cemetery. Using a mixture of scientific and artistic observations, join biologist and artist, Luke as we explore the unique sound scapes that are created by the birds, mammals, amphibians, insects, and other inhabitants of the Prospect area. Learn about the subtle differences that make your own backyard special, why listening to sound scapes is important, and what we can learn from the world around us by simply taking a moment to open our ears. We will examine a sound scape recorded nearby for the Brownsboro Trail Alliance as an example. Afterwards, we will hike from City Hall to Putney Pond to practice intentional listening and decipher what the world is telling us. Please wear appropriate foot wear and dress for the weather.

Presenters Terry Rankhorn and Lt. Colonel Michael McKeehan will each speak for 45 minutes and host a short question-and-answer session at the end.

Prospect resident, Terry Rankhorn is a retired FBI Agent with 21 years of service. He is a specialist in investigating fraud, specifically cyber fraud. He has operated as a private investigator since his retirement and now runs his own investigative firm. He also heads a volunteer project called Virtual Safehouse, an online forum that educates people on how to spot and avoid online scams. Lt. Colonel Michael McKeehan is the Assistant Chief of Police with the Prospect Police Department. Lt Col McKeehan retired from the Louisville Metro Police Department in 2014 and has worked for the City of Prospect, KY, since 2015. Over a 30-year career, he has served as a Patrol Officer, Field Training Officer, Criminal Investigator, Undercover Narcotics Detective, Tactical Instructor, Police Sergeant, and Assistant Chief. With an interest in technology, and its place in law enforcement, Lt Col McKeehan sought out training in cybercrime and digital evidence preservation/collection from the FBI, Dept. of Homeland Security, U.S. Dept. of Justice, Kentucky State Police, DOJT, Carnegie Mellon University, Google Inc., and Interpol resulting in many successful investigations/prosecutions. Lt. Col McKeehan is also an 8-year veteran of the US Army Infantry and served in the 1st Gulf War with the 101st Airborne Division.

Why did we switch you asked? Well, it is user friendly and provides real time information to residents as they travel the globe.

Once signed up, residents will receive an email letting them know they have been enrolled. They will receive an email at the time the officer checks their house, the officer can note any concerns or information the homeowner needs, such as moved packages to the back, side door left unlocked officer secured, unlisted vehicle in driveway but home secure. **THIS IS REAL TIME** so there is no delay. Then an email at the expiration of their watch is sent.

Police officers will make regular checks on residents' homes while they are away and will take action should unauthorized vehicles or persons be near the house. This highly successful program is a valuable free service for residents.
